It isn't unusual to hear talk of your ministry. Over the past couple of weeks, thanks to a collision of opportunities and diary mayhem, I've been involved in a constant round of URC gatherings all of which have been exploring ministry. The last, which has just ended, was a unique gathering Westminster created to bring together all 13 Synod Moderators along with those in each Synod responsible for decisions about ministerial deployment and a number of key staff from Church House. "How is your ministry going?" was a question.

Again and again what has really struck me is that the question has one letter too many. That first "y" is really deceiving and dangerous. Cut it, and the real question emerges. "How is our ministry going?" is the really vital thing. Leave it as "your" and ministry dissolves into the ocean of individualism that washes across our culture. Ministry becomes my possession and property. It is about my time, my gifts, my calling, my likes, my choices. I fly solo.

I'm more convinced than I ever have been that the URC is crying out for ministers who know, in every atom of our being, that our ministry is shared; shared with God whose Spirit is way ahead of us, with each other as we share ordination's privileges and responsibilities, with everyone in all the congregations we'll serve. That's why learning how



to work together, pray together and live together matters so much here. That's why I so delight in Westminster as a place where we constantly encounter others. Of course it isn't easy. Forgiveness and humility can test us profoundly, just as the first Christians had to learn over and over. But dropping that "y" to embrace our shared ministry is God's real call upon us all.
