# Choose Love...

I think the shortest and most poignant book by Rowan Williams emerged from the horror of 911. He called it *Writing in the Dust* after Jesus' defiance of the mob weighing the stones in their hands preparing execution (John 8).

Williams was close to the Twin Towers that day. He wrote a meditation on the difference of words: the religious words invoking God's will for suicide pilots; the words of love phoned from the planes to families and friends by passengers, believers and non-believers, discovering that they were being murdered. "Something of the chill of 11 September2001 lies in the contrast." (p. 1).

Again terror has come, this time claiming concert-goers in Manchester. Of course, terror is a perpetual nightmare elsewhere. We do well to notice that we are more likely to light candles and hold vigil when attack comes close. We must remember the world, and never only our own. But I think, as people connected to place and family and friends, it isn't wrong that some loss and pain strikes more keenly. It matters, in these days of aftermath, that we find words and offer silences, that we



foster solidarity. It matters, as a faith is being contorted by some, that we abide in faith as the promise of life in all its fullness. It matters that we still live in Easter's light and in Christ's victory. It matters, too, that we hear, alongside scripture, a voice like Tony Walsh's in his poem *This Is The Place*, and his concluding words reciting it the day after the bombing: "Choose Love, Manchester!"
